



Scrumming it: a step change towards greater landfill diversion

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Introduction

- Hutt City Council owns
 Silverstream Landfill
- 5 Year rolling average: 154, 454 tonnes (174, 685 tonnes in 2023)
- The challenge: the Landfill is filling up way too quick!
- Actions projects to tackle significant waste streams underway







Shift to resource recovery over the last 4 years

- Pay by weight
- Enhanced traffic flow
- Improved green waste dropoff
- Upgraded hazardous waste drop-off
- New "smart shelter" and storage containers
- Introduced the voucher scheme to incentivise diversion













The idea



Waitakere Refuse and Recycling Transfer Station

- Field trip to Auckland in August 2022
- Decided to replicate voucher scheme in April 2023



Issues...

Weighbridge located at entrance to Landfill – unable to weigh diverted items/materials



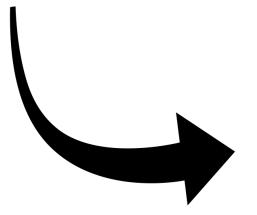
Dealing with hazardous waste: still need landfill operator's expertise





So, that's all great - but...

- Limited uptake of voucher scheme
- Contract shortcomings with Earthlink, our resource recovery partner only allowed for the dismantling of voluntarily dropped-off items/materials for transportation back to Earthlink depot







Introducing the landfill diversion "scrum"



According to Wikipedia: "A scrummage, commonly known simply as a scrum, is a method of restarting play in <u>rugby</u> <u>football</u> that involves players packing closely together with their heads down and attempting to gain possession of the ball."



Applying the "scrum" concept to resource recovery

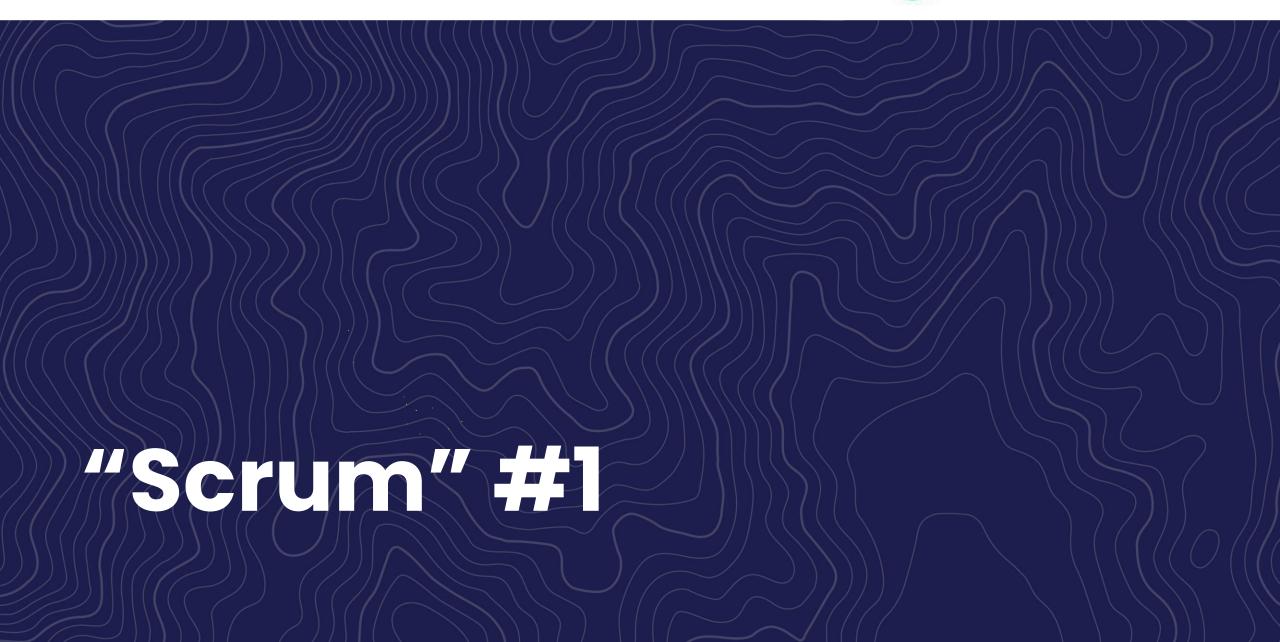
- Stop and engage all transfer station users
- Parking offered under the shelter
- Teams check each vehicle for recyclable or reuseable items/material
- Vouchers issued based on weight or volume

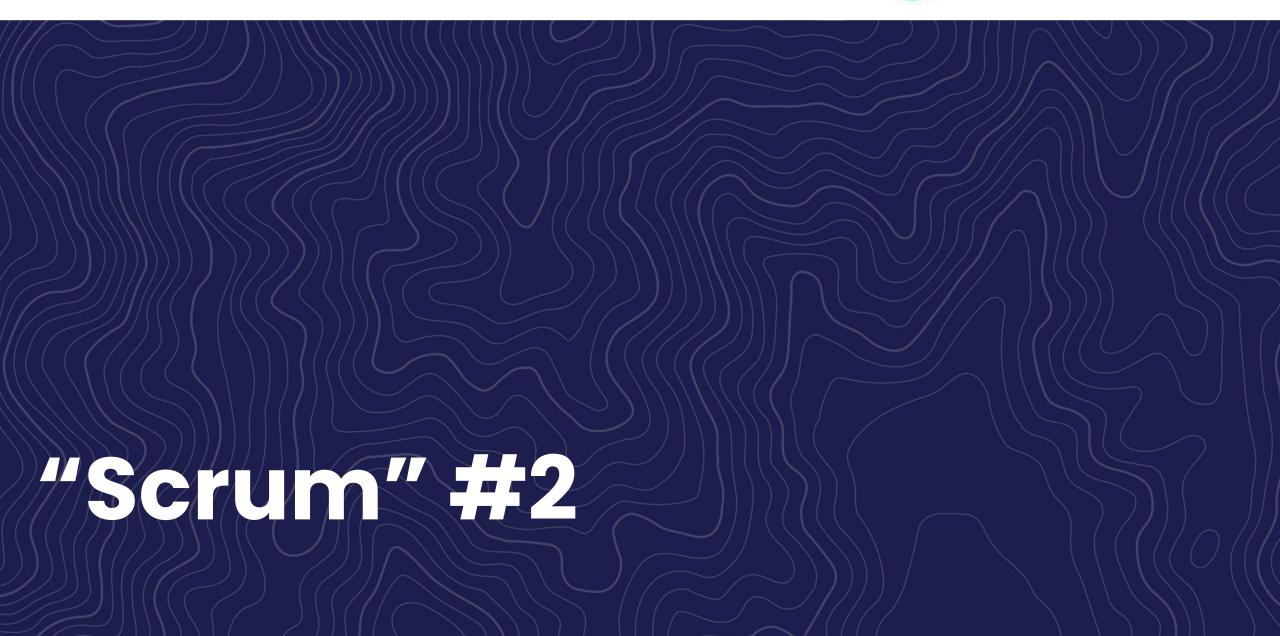
Results

- 51 Vouchers issued
- 2.7 Tonnes diverted
- 78 "Behaviour Changing" engagements











Results

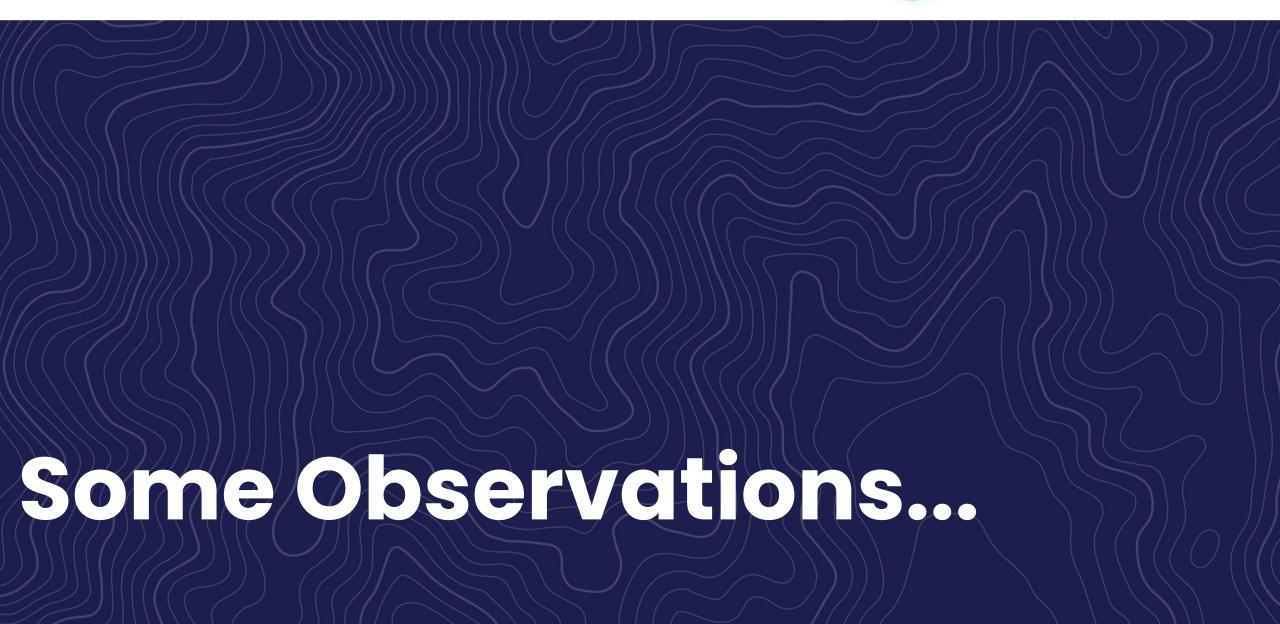
- 24 Vouchers issued
- 0.9 tonnes diverted
- 73 "Behaviour Changing" engagements

- Active engagement is essential!
- Need all stakeholders to work as a team
- Wide range of skills and outgoing personalities are required
- Most people are willing to do the right thing but there are some tricky customers
- Diversion is wonderful but the real win is the many "behaviour changing" engagements that take place daily with all transfer station users...







Good news stories...

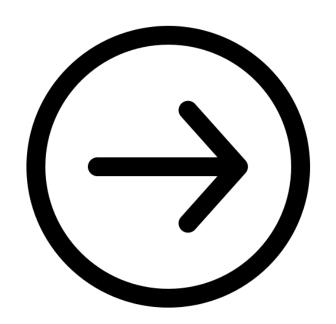






Next steps:

- New contract with Earthlink more "scrums" and different KPIs with focus on active engagement
- Development of Operations Manual to codify processes, practices and procedures
