 To create a resource recovery centre that is a thriving, vibrant destination for the Wellington City

• A collaborative space that supports local resilience, the circular economy and regeneration

• To provide best practice resource recovery services in Wellington City in alignment with the waste

• To work towards the project being self-supporting by the end of the initial Term (of funding).

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Why a partnership?

Sustainability Trust couldn't operate this centre without funding support.

WCC wanted an innner city location to establish one of several resource recovery centres for the Wellington City community

Sustainability Trust was pretty much ready to go, the space had been operating as a shop selling items to help people live sustainabily and to recycle small items

Several WCC Councillors were very supportive and keen to see the centre established

What's been hard?

- Establishing Trust two parties coming • together in partnership relies on trust being established relatively quickly
- WCC acting like a funder ullet
- Sustainability Trust acting like a grant seeker ullet
- Big organisation vs small organisation: •
 - Power dynamic \bullet
 - Decision making processes very different \bullet
 - Layers of sign off and accountability ۲ different
- Working out what a true partnership means and how to do it.





What's been successful?

- Up and running quickly
- Regular governance meetings with senior staff from both organisations
- Great publicity/promotion from WCC
- Great partnership with the Tip Shop to relay larger items to their site once a month.
- Widely embraced by the public





Success to date:

In the 12 months to end of March 2025 we have:

- 16885 service users approx. 324 per week or 81 people per day
- Diverted 34.5 tonnes, including:
 - 14.5 tonnnes of e-waste
 - 2.7 tonnes collected for the Tip Shop
 - 1.1 tonnes of batteries
 - 1 tonne of plastic lids
 - 1.3 tonnes of metal lids
 - 9.8 tonnes of other metal items
 - .5 tonne of car seats
 - .9 tonne of bikes
- 372 hours of volunteer time at our Repair Cafes
- 781.5 hours of volunteer time in the centre = 20 full time weeks of volunteer time



TEARO What's next?

- End of FY result likely to be positive, but is it enough to sustain the operation without external funding support?
- Funding is assured until Dec 2026, after that we'll need to enter into new discussions with WCC about the future of the centre

• WCC are scoping two more sites for RRC in the Wellington area to begin operating within the next 12 months

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
