### The Service

- Operates 24/5, with R&M weekends
- Operates every day except Christmas
- Upgraded in 2022 30% increased capacity
- Employs more than 70 people
- Diverse team
- Handles around 10,000t per month



# Journey to Date

- Material Recovery Facility (MRF) was built by Visy Recycling in 2008 for the Auckland Council
- Re.Group won a tender to operate the MRF in 2022
- Contract started 1<sup>st</sup> July 2024
- Focus on partnership, being open and transparent

# Re.Group

- A strong commitment to partnership by both parties
- Open approach to communication and data sharing we all have roles to play, and every role is important
- Transition went largely to plan, we used the wider experience of Re.Group to support when required and established a good working relationship with the incumbent, Visy
- Operational changes, improvements are having a positive effect on our environment and commercial sustainability
- Social outcomes, Māori Responsiveness, progress made, but still lots more to do to be truly genuine in this space

- Council now owns the site and facility operational and strategic asset
- Partnership approach with Re.Group we bring different contributions
- Contract governance is productive and regular
- Greater involvement and visibility of operations, costs, asset management and end markets
- Increased collaboration with collectors
- Oversight of plant performance and output quality
- Improved data insight and reporting for early identification of issues and trends

#### SITUATION

- Contamination is high
- Public understanding of Kerbside recycling is low
- Attitudes are fractured, rumours persist "it all goes to landfill"

### **BOLD NEW APPROACH:**

**COLLABORATION** – Sharing resources and audiences with complimentary organisations, within and beyond Auckland Council network e.g. Community Recycling Centres

**DIVERSIFICATION** – Relevant messaging via diverse voices and formats

**AMPLIFICATION** – Sharing and promoting each other's work

- MRFs and kerbside collections are not the silver bullet to save us from our troubles – they play a key role but not in isolation
- We need holistic change to how we manage our resources, embracing education and product stewardship, whilst incentivising the laggards (most people!) to recycle more i.e. deposit returns
- Needs to be supported by clear and effective government policy
- We all need to be open to change



# What next?

- The Auckland Council MRF and site can evolve to accept different materials or perform different roles i.e. reprocessing
- We need to keep investing in technology
- Collaboration keeps us learning together, and advancing together
- Maintain a focus on the 'why' and celebrate success
