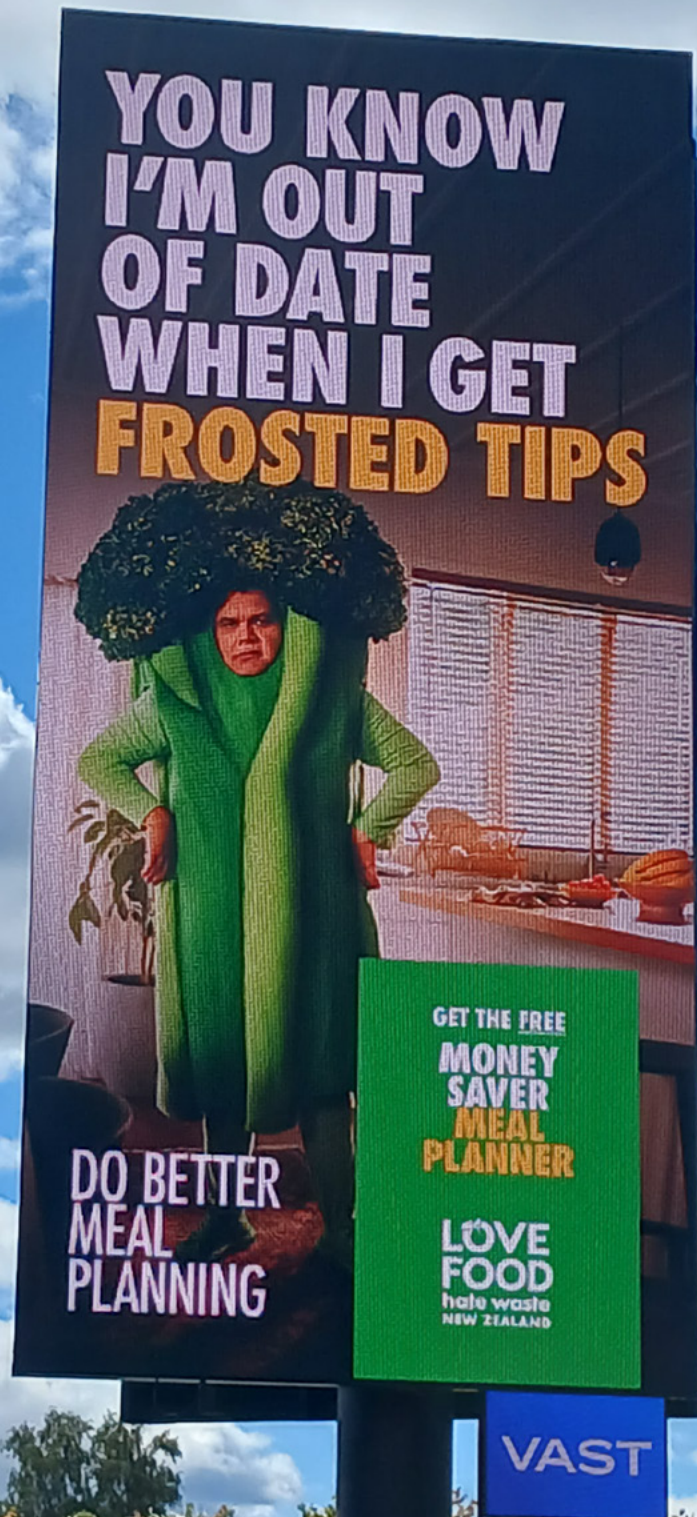




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who we are

advocacy & influence

While our members worked on a huge number of projects, WasteMINZ drove three significant projects this financial year.



Soil reuse

WasteMINZ advocated for the development of a nationwide framework for the reuse of soils through both public awareness and government outreach. Following a soil reuse workshop at the WasteMINZ Conference in May 2024, a working group was formed to develop a white paper. The Reclaiming Resources - Optimising soil reuse in infrastructure and development paper was released publicly and sent to the Minister for the Environment in November 2024. Radio NZ then interviewed the chair of the working group. In early 2025, WasteMINZ met with the Minister for the Environment to discuss the recommendations in the white paper, and in June 2025, the Minister announced her support for a national soil management framework. Work is progressing and will be completed at the end of 2025.



Battery disposal

WasteMINZ advocated for increased regulation for disposing of small batteries to reduce safety and environmental concerns. In November 2024, WasteMINZ sent a joint letter, signed by WasteMINZ, the Waste & Recycling Industry Association, Christchurch City Council and Auckland Council, to the Minister for the Environment, the Minister for Workplace Relations and Safety, and the Minister for Infrastructure. The letter highlighted the serious risks of battery collection in New Zealand, and requested urgent action to expedite battery recovery through a mandatory product stewardship programme. This was accompanied by a media release, which was picked up and reported on by Radio NZ and Newstalk ZB. Following more discussion and advocacy from the industry, the Ministry for the Environment has provided funding towards WasteMINZ's environmental scan project which will be completed in 2025.



Lifting the lid on the economics of waste

WasteMINZ recognised a gap in knowledge about the combined impact of the activities of the waste, resource recovery and contaminated land management sectors on the New Zealand economy. WasteMINZ then commissioned research, undertaken by NZIER, to provide a robust evidence-base of the sectors' contributions (now and in the future) to the New Zealand economy. Released in June 2025, the report will be used to:

- Inform and influence decision makers and policy settings
- Encourage appropriate investment in the waste, resource recovery and contaminated land management sectors
- Engage the government in our sectors
- Articulate the role of the waste and resource recovery and contaminated land sector in delivering on the government's priorities of economic growth, cost-effectiveness, reducing regulation, and reducing emissions
- Demonstrate that the sectors are essential and a part of critical infrastructure.



advocacy & influence

We advocated and influenced key decision makers on a number of different topics.

Submissions require a significant investment of time and resources for our members and team and make an impact by influencing the creation of government policy. This year saw a change from our traditional approach to submissions, which had historically seen up to 8 separate submissions for each consultation. Instead, a single submission for each consultation was produced, providing a more coherent and united voice – while still allowing different viewpoints to be captured. Submission topics included:

- Repairability Labels
- Waste Minimisation Act and Litter Act
- Consumer Guarantees (Right to Repair) Amendment Bill
- Civil Defence Legislative Review
- Government Procurement Rules
- Ministry for Primary Industries – Biosecurity Regulations
- Guidelines for Beneficial use of Biosolids
- Plastic Packaging Product Stewardship Scheme
- Basel Convention – Transboundary Movement of e-waste
- Farm Plastics Product Stewardship Scheme Regulations
- Environmental Protection Authority – Persistent Organic Pollutants Storage and Disposal
- The second emissions reduction plan

These letters were compiled by a number of WasteMINZ sector group steering committees and working groups, the WasteMINZ team, and in collaboration with other organisations. They provided our perspectives and resulted in the Ministry for the Environment's involvement in two major projects – Phase 1 of the soil surplus framework project and a small battery environmental scan. Topics included:

- Container Return Scheme – a joint letter signed by 80 organisations (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- WasteMINZ and government relationship (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- Waste Levy and Behaviour Change Letter (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- Review of the Effectiveness of the Waste Levy (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- Advocating for a soil reuse framework (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- Disaster Waste (Sent to the Environment Select Committee)
- Advocating for nationwide direction on disposal of small batteries (sent to the Minister for the Environment)
- Residential lead (Minister of Health, Minister of Education and Minister for the Environment)

We also fostered a closer relationship with the Ministry for the Environment and the Climate Change Commission who now regularly seek meetings and discussions with steering committees.

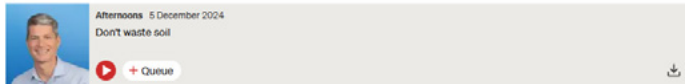

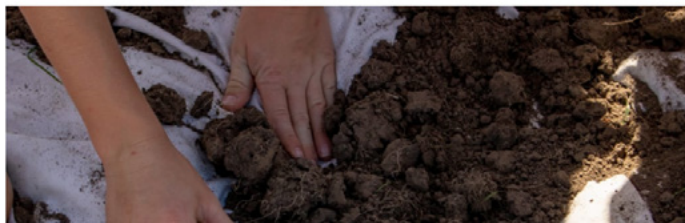

media engagement

Media engagement included 6 media releases across the year and 10 media mentions across multiple different channels - including national radio and digital articles, and smaller local articles. Topics included lead in residential properties, WasteMINZ Awards for Excellence, disposal of batteries, soil reuse, expanded polystyrene, compostable packaging, kerbside food waste collections and e-waste.



public outreach

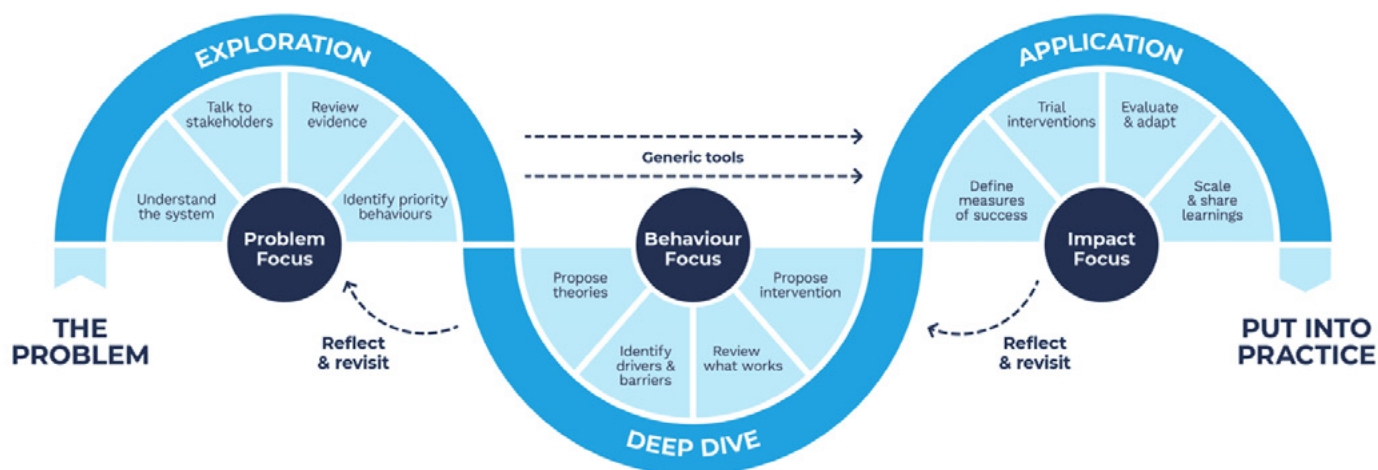
We used social media channels (particularly LinkedIn and Facebook) and our website to engage with the public.

- We received more than 83,000 visits to our website over the year
- Our most popular webpage was the Battery Collection Facilities page - which showed us that this is an important issue not only to our members but to the public
- Our engagement rate (which shows us how effective our social media posts are) were higher than the general average for both Facebook and LinkedIn;
 - Facebook - 6% (compared to an average of between 2-5%)
 - LinkedIn - 16% (compared to an average of 3-4%)

On social media, we raised awareness of the issue of lead in residential properties, International Compost Awareness Week, shared informative blog articles - including member spotlights - and shared important key updates within the industry, such as government consultations and legislation updates.

Delivery of two online training sessions – Harnessing behavioural science to support waste minimisation

Some members of the steering committee worked with senior researchers from BehaviourWorks Australia to prepare two online training sessions. These sessions supported people working in the waste sector to amplify their work's impact by using cutting edge behavioural science insights.

Zero waste events webinar

In August 2024, the steering committee ran a successful webinar where various behaviour change practitioners shared their experiences and approaches to minimising waste during the management of events. The presentations were practical, and a resource list was developed and shared with participants afterwards.

Storytelling – showcasing behaviour change examples of success

Throughout the year, the steering committee members contributed various articles to the WasteMINZ Circular, highlighting how behaviour change insights were used in a variety of projects and ways. Topics discussed included: scaling circular services at scale, encouraging reuse behaviours in the workplace and tackling plastic pollution in New Zealand.

Advocacy to central government on the implementation of a comprehensive soil management framework for New Zealand

Following the WasteMINZ 2024 CLM Conference workshop on soil reuse, a working group was formed who developed a white paper entitled 'Creating a Circular Economy for Soil in Aotearoa New Zealand'. This paper set out the findings from the workshop and identified the current barriers regarding soil reuse. The paper was provided to various Ministers in November 2024 and the working group held a webinar during the annual World Soil Day in December 2024. The working group and the steering committee continued to advocate for the development of a soils management framework which led to the Minister announcing the availability of funding to start the first phase of the development of the framework.

Waste Industry Guidance for the Disposal of low-level asbestos-contaminated soil at a landfill guidance

A working group under the steering committee prepared some guidance for the waste industry. The guidance relates specifically to the transport, receipt, and disposal of soils that a Suitably Qualified and Experienced Practitioner (SQEP) or competent person has determined does not contain asbestos-containing material (ACM) or friable asbestos in a quantity that is likely to lead to airborne contamination at a level that exceeds trace levels. The guidance aims to create a nationally consistent approach to the transportation and landfilling of asbestos contaminated soils and was developed in consultation with WorkSafe and the wider industry.

The development of technical guidelines for characterising surplus soil for disposal

A working group under the steering committee prepared good practice guidance for soil producers to characterise surplus soils being disposed off-site to ensure they are suitable for the intended disposal location. Before production of these guidelines, there was no guidance available for surplus soil producers on the sampling requirements to make informed decisions about the suitability of either disposal or reuse.

Feedback on the Technical Guidelines for Disposal to Land

The steering committee prioritised the review of the Technical Guidelines for Disposal to Land as part of the workplan for 2025. They started the process with the development of a survey which ran for several months to gather feedback from the users of the guidelines to help and inform the scope of the review.

Membership drive with class 3 and 4 landfill operators

A targeted campaign was undertaken to build out and grow the network of class 3 and 4 landfill operators.

Facilitation of the collaborative session at the WasteMINZ conference

The Chair of the steering committee developed and facilitated the collaborative session at the WasteMINZ 2025 conference where participants discussed the waste and resource recovery sector's ambitions with regards to the changing regulatory environment, what the blockers are and what actions can be taken collectively to address these. Topics discussed included the Technical Guidelines for Disposal to Land, review of the Waste Minimisation Act and Litter Act, the Planning Act and infrastructure requirements, and how to best manage emissions from waste.

health, safety & wellbeing sector group

Kerbside Collection Traffic Leader (KCTL) Phase Out

The introduction of the NZ Guide to Temporary Traffic Management (NZGTTM), along with the planned rollout of kerbside collector micro-credential qualifications, promoted a review of the KCTL warrant card as the source of skills validation for kerbside driver and collection employees. The KCTL was overdue for a review and the move away from the previous Code of Practice for Temporary Traffic Management (CoPTTM) to a guideline approach enables companies to better determine their own means of compliance based on their risk. The decision was made to phase out the KCTL warrant system in favour of a verified skills guideline allowing organisations who have the necessary inhouse expertise to induct and train their own employees, or this could be provided by an external training provider. The guideline is currently under development and due for completion by the end of 2025, and a phase out information webinar was planned for July 2025.

Violence towards Kerbside Collection Staff

The steering committee had a number of discussions about the issue of violence and or aggression towards kerbside collection staff, including possible options to progress training or upskilling of both the front-line staff, and the managers/supervisors in both the waste operators and the territorial authorities who manage the contracts. The committee decided to approach an organisation that specialises in this type of training to discuss options.

The Health, Safety & Wellbeing Sector Group Steering Committee held elections in the 2024-2025 year, and we have listed the previous committee to recognise the dedication of those committee members.

International Compost Awareness Week (ICAW) 2025 Campaign:

The steering committee conducted a compost awareness campaign to celebrate ICAW2025, which consisted of a series of topical articles on composting, published each day during the week. The campaign achieved great success reaching over 6,600 interactions across WasteMINZ's Facebook and LinkedIn social media channels, and 640 page views on the WasteMINZ blog content. The most popular post during the campaign was "10 things you shouldn't put in your compost".

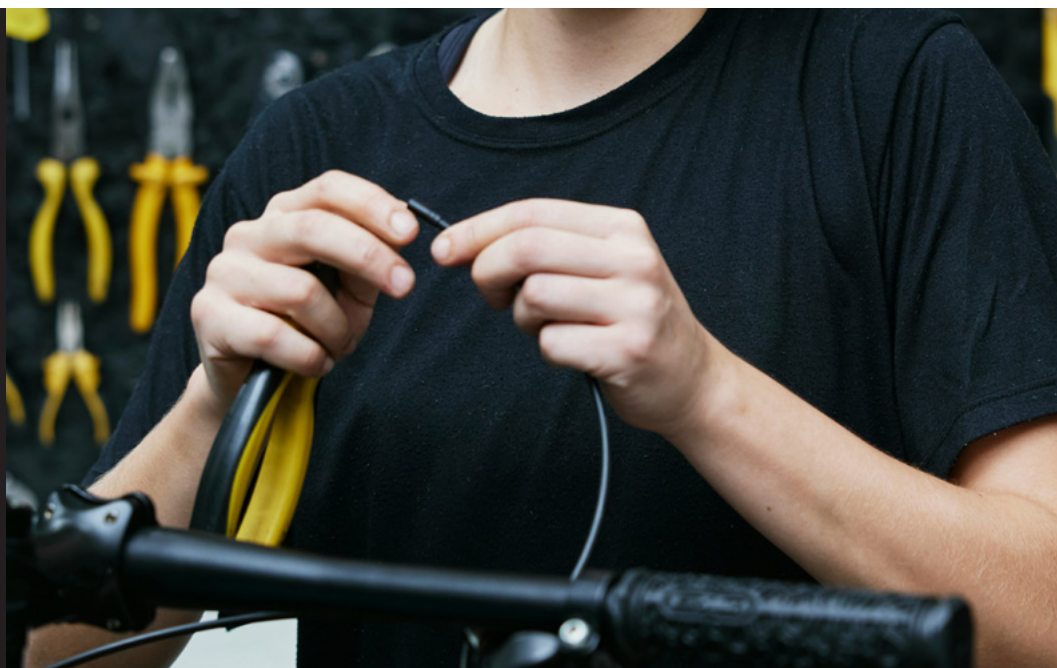
Waste Hierarchy Webinar Series

As part of continuing to educate and inform about waste, a series of webinars focusing on organic waste at each level of the waste hierarchy was planned. Each webinar showcased three different speakers who talked about various actions that could be taken at that level, why they are important, how they contribute, and what their organisations are progressing in this space. Level 1 - Reduce, Rethink, Redesign, and Level 2 - Reuse, Repair, Repurpose have been completed, with webinars for levels 3-5 planned during the second half of 2025.

product stewardship sector group

Advocacy

The previous and current steering committee's workplan was dominated by submission opportunities. In addition to public consultations, the steering committee had also been asked to comment on select committee investigations into repairability labels and presented an oral submission in support of the Consumer Guarantees (Right to Repair) Amendment Bill.

Webinars

To support wider advocacy efforts, the steering committee also organised four webinars on reuse, repair, and redesign. The steering committee constantly sought to raise awareness of interventions at the highest level of the waste hierarchy, through use of case studies and amplifying stories of success through these webinars.

Container Return Scheme (CRS) Advocacy

The recycling and resource recovery sector needs certainty of government decisions to pursue investment for infrastructure and plan for the future. Certainty on the future of a CRS is one area that the sector group has been advocating for. An advocacy statement fed into the creation of a wider industry letter to the Minister for the Environment on the need for a decision on the future of a CRS in New Zealand.

Expanded Polystyrene (EPS) Review

The Construction Waste Working Group completed a literature review on whether EPS meets the threshold as an environmental contaminant under the Resource Management Act (RMA). This piece of work investigated New Zealand and offshore studies of EPS use, primarily in construction, as well as alternatives available to EPS. Following member feedback, a peer review was undertaken, and the intention is to release the updated version before the end of 2025.

territorial authorities' officers forum

VISION | To facilitate a clear and cohesive voice for the local government sector in relation to waste minimisation and resource recovery issues in order to influence and shape future outcomes. This will be achieved through advocacy on behalf of the local government sector, leading strategic waste sector thinking and problem solving, and encouraging information and knowledge sharing.



Effectiveness of Waste Disposal Levy Report

The Territorial Authorities' Officers' 2024 collaborative fund was utilised to develop a Waste Disposal Levy Report and Morrison Low were selected for this project. The paper reiterated the value the territorial authorities obtain through their current allocation of the waste disposal levy, including the risks, implications and possible unintended consequences associated with any reduction. It included case studies of the waste disposal levy in action at various territorial authorities across Aotearoa thereby reflecting the actual experiences of territorial authorities across the country and how additional levy revenue has impacted their ability to make change in waste minimisation. Upon completion, the report was published and shared with the Minister for the Environment.

Territorial Authorities' Officers (TAO) Forum at the WasteMINZ Annual Conference

The steering committee developed and facilitated the TAO Forum at the WasteMINZ annual conference in order to provide opportunities for territorial authorities to network, share knowledge and identify their priorities.

Mayoral Letter Advocacy Campaign

In November 2024, a sample letter requesting a transparent and consultative review process for future amendments to the Waste Minimisation Act 2008 was provided by the TAO Forum to all territorial authorities. The TAO Forum asked for their support by contacting their local mayor to sign and send the letter to a number of ministers, including the Minister for the Environment. At least 30 individual and jointly signed letters from territorial authorities across Aotearoa were sent as part of this initiative.

The Territorial Authorities' Officers Forum held elections in the 2024-2025 year, and we have listed the previous committee to recognise the dedication of those committee members.

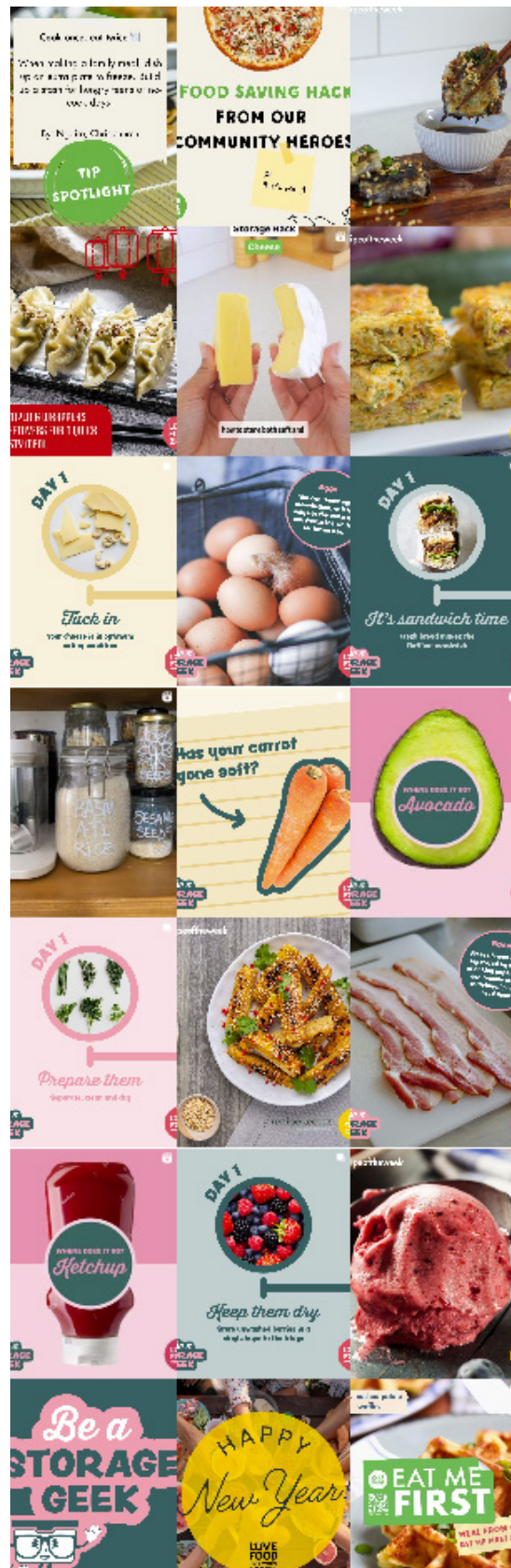

Conference 2025

The 2025 WasteMINZ Conference & Expo took place at Te Pae Christchurch Convention Centre from 9–12 June, drawing 565 attendees from across Aotearoa and overseas. With the theme **Ko māia, ko angitu – Fortune favours the bold**, delegates were encouraged to challenge their thinking, discuss common challenges and enjoy valuable networking opportunities, which generated excellent post-conference feedback.

The event was supported by 21 valued sponsors including Tonkin + Taylor, Hill Labs, ECP, Stego Industries, EcoCentral, Davis Ogilvie & Partners, GHD, SLR Consulting (NZ), Stantec New Zealand, Winstone Wallboards, Re.Group, Foodstuffs, Envitech, EROAD, WasteCo, Plasback NZ (2021), NALG, Powerco, Datanest, and Lion, as well as a full exhibition hall comprised of 43 trade sites.

Two successful workshops (which ran at full capacity) launched the programme on Monday 9 June – the Territorial Authorities’ Officers Forum and the Balancing risks and values: Pragmatic approaches to contaminated land management workshop. The Awards for Excellence, on Tuesday, 10 June, celebrated sector achievements across the waste hierarchy, with categories spanning reduction, reuse, resource recovery, disposal innovation, research, advocacy and included two Young Professional awards.

Two popular site tours – Kate Valley Landfill and Gareth James Energy Park, and the Inner City Tour visiting EcoShop, EcoSort and the University of Canterbury Library Repair Space – concluded the conference programme, both of which sold out very early.
